#### HELPING GUIDE GUARDIAN AIR

Due to the generosity of Mike Schroeder from Sedona, Guardian Air was able to purchase two sets of night vision goggles. "The night vision goggles make our jobs much safer, make almost every aspect of flight safer. The crews appreciate having top-of-the-line gear and the safety that the gear brings them" – Adal Lopez, Guardian Air clinical manager.

Schroeder said, "Guardian Air is a critical component of a time-sensitive, life-saving emergency response system. Since I'm a pilot, I have an understanding of the talent and equipment necessary to accomplish their critical mission. I was presented with the opportunity to help fund the equipment purchase that allows pilots to function in a night environment, as emergencies don't pick the time of day to happen. If you need emergency transport, you're in great hands with the NAH Guardian Air team."



### **VOLUNTEER SERVICE AWARDS**

Philanthropy consists of giving one's time, treasure and talent. The volunteers at NAH embody all three of these attributes. In November, volunteers at Verde Valley Medical Center (VVMC) and Flagstaff Medical Center (FMC) were honored for the time they have dedicated to NAH over the years at the first Legacy Volunteer Awards ceremony. VVMC volunteers were honored for a combined 503 years of service. FMC volunteers were honored for a combined 485 years of service. ## STOP THE BLEED

The Office of Philanthropy committed over \$25,000 to support the Stop the Bleed initiative at schools in the Flagstaff Unified School District (FUSD). Stop the Bleed is a grassroots national awareness campaign and call to action that encourages bystanders to become trained, equipped and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency before a professional arrives. With this commitment, FUSD schools will be equipped with 43 specialized Stop the Bleed kits which include tourniquets and other medical materials to help in a bleeding emergency.



"The Flagstaff Unified School District is grateful for the generous support of the NAH Office of Philanthropy to provide Stop the Bleed kits and training for all of our schools and worksites. This partnership better equips our school staff to act quickly and effectively to make a difference in the event of a serious accident or emergency," said Michael Penca, FUSD superintendent.
