The story of gratitude. It is embedded in everything we do as a philanthropy



Elevating our care

New services, new providers

In July 2023, NAH opened a pulmonary clinic in Flagstaff, offering a full spectrum of diagnostic and therapeutic procedures designed to treat and care for respiratory disorders, including obstructive pulmonary diseases. Michael Reidy, MD, heads the department that has introduced six new providers to the Flagstaff community. They are Aaron Jaffe, MD, Yu Ya Huang, MD, Hamish Patel, DO, Yassir Rahman, MD, James Rasmussen, MD, and Jelisa Vick, ACNP. The NAH pulmonary clinic is located at 1215 N. Beaver St., Suite 203.

Late in Fiscal Year 2024, NAH's gastroenterology (GI) services moved to a new stateof-the-art clinic at 1895 N. Jasper Dr., Suite 1, in Flagstaff. With more room to serve our patients, we have increased the number of GI providers. Andrew Overhiser, MD, heads the department. New providers include Sandra Kellett, PA, Cameron Allen, NP, and Jennifer Quigley, NP.

National recognition

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In May 2024, Northern Arizona Healthcare Orthopedic Surgery Center (NAHOSC) received national recognition as one of the top 1% of outpatient surgical centers in Arizona by U.S. News & World Report's Best Ambulatory Surgery Centers.

Cardiovascular clinical trials

Our cardiovascular clinical research program was developed in 2006 and is based at Verde Valley Medical Center. Participants join our studies from sites throughout the world and help improve care in heart disease, heart attacks, peripheral arterial disease, high blood pressure, cholesterol management and diabetes.

Building community

Stop the Bleed with Flagstaff Unified School District (FUSD)

NAH donated \$25,000 to purchase 43 bleed control stations for FUSD. in February 2024, as part of the Stop the Bleed program. The kits have been installed in all schools in the district to help prevent blood loss from injuries before medical care can be administered. Having bleeding control kits available when there is an emergency can save lives. Shawn Bowker, BSN, RN, CEN, CFRN, is NAH's injury prevention outreach coordinator and provides Stop the Bleed training to FUSD at no cost.



Later in the year, Shawn was awarded the Arizona Department of Health Services 2024 Injury Prevention Achievement Award for initiating and delivering injury prevention and harm reduction programs across northern Arizona. Stop the Bleed is just one of many community programs that Shawn manages.

Safe Child Center turns 30

The Safe Child Center is celebrating 30 years of serving children from birth through age 18 living in Coconino, Mohave, Yavapai, Navajo and Apache counties, including the American Indian Nations. It opened in 1994. As a division of the Children's Health Center, the Safe Child Center is dedicated to reducing the stress children experience as victims of suspected crime. The program collaborates with law enforcement and child protection agencies to ensure children are treated with dignity and respect throughout the investigative process.

An anniversary celebration is planned for late August 2024, where community partners and colleagues will be invited to learn more about the Safe Child Center's positive impact on northern Arizona's most vulnerable population.



Bill Johnson was a friend, a pillar of the Sedona community and a passionate ambassador ensuring that emergency care remained close to home. Together with his wife Debbie, NAH created a scholarship in his name to support our Sedona Emergency Department staff.

NAH colleagues joined our Office of Philanthropy and the Foundation for Hospital Art for a fun morning of volunteer painting. Called "PaintFests Across Interstate-40 in Celebration of 40 Years of Patient Impact," the event produced art that is now hanging in our facilities.





Guardian Air Transport (GAT) hosted an open house in June 2024 and welcomed dozens of patients and agency partners. Attendees were able to tour the GAT hangar and meet flight nurses and crew thanks to the NAH Office of Philanthropy's sponsorship of the food and fun!



The Office of Philanthropy sponsored Wheel Fun this fiscal year, assisting with their operating funds. Wheel Fun is a Verde Valley nonprofit that encourages young people to put away their electronic devices and instead get on mountain bikes to enjoy the outdoors.



A new sidewalk mural has been installed outside of the EntireCare clinic in Cottonwood to engage with and promote healthy healing among pediatric patients.

Molly Blank Fund

Molly Blank was a philanthropist, sculptor, dancer, social justice advocate and a loving mother and role model to her sons, Michael Blank and Arthur M. Blank. In her honor, the Molly Blank Fund of the Arthur M. Blank Family Foundation, awarded a grant to the Safe Child Center (SCC).

American Rescue Plan Act

NAH was awarded a grant from the City of Flagstaff through United Way for the Mental Health Matters for First Responders pilot program. First responders, like paramedics and emergency dispatchers, play a crucial role in keeping our communities safe and healthy. Unfortunately, occupational stress in first responders is linked to an increased likelihood of mental health issues such as anxiety, depression, post-traumatic stress disorder and suicide. A

recent study in Arizona showed EMS workers face an almost 40% greater risk of suicide compared to other Arizona residents. This program allots therapy sessions solely for our first responders to receive Critical Incident Stress Debriefing and one-on-one trauma-informed counseling.
