About NAH

Northern Arizona Healthcare (NAH) is a nonprofit health system that serves all patients regardless of their ability to pay.

Fast Facts

- We are the largest health care system in northern Arizona, a region encompassing more than 50,000 square miles.
- NAH has a team of over 4,000 doctors, nurses and other health care experts who serve a region of more than 750,000 residents.
- We also serve many tourists visiting regional landmarks, including the Grand Canyon, Sedona, Monument Valley and Lake Powell.
- More than 25 percent of NAH's patients represent disadvantaged populations, such as those who are uninsured or who are Medicaid beneficiaries.
- More than 24 percent of NAH patients are members of tribal communities. At Flagstaff Medical Center (FMC), that number is about 33 percent. Approximately 9 percent of our employees are members of tribal populations.
- NAH has been consistently recognized by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services and Leapfrog Hospital Safety Grades for excellence in health care.
- U.S. News and World Report ranked NAH's Orthopedic Surgery Center among the top 1 percent of the 212 ambulatory surgery centers in Arizona in 2024, based on the quality of care delivered.

Community Outreach

- We invest heavily in the health and well-being of the northern Arizona region through initiatives like bi-monthly blood drives in multiple locations.
- We offer bi-annual \$10 sports physicals for student-athletes, eliminating economic barriers for area youth wanting to participate in school sports. All money collected from the physicals is donated to area school athletic programs.
- October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. In honor of the observance, low-cost mammograms are offered to uninsured patients every October, encouraging community members to take preventive measures for their breast health.
- NAH recently donated funds to purchase bleed control stations for the Flagstaff Unified School District (FUSD) and Tuba City Unified School District (TCUSD). The stations have been installed in schools throughout the districts to help prevent blood loss from injuries before other medical care can be administered. NAH also provides no-cost training regarding the stations to school district employees.
- The Taylor House, owned and operated by NAH, provides caring, affordable and convenient lodging for out-of-town patients and families to stay close to Flagstaff Medical Center, as needed.



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Hospitals

- We provide comprehensive health care services through two hospitals – Flagstaff Medical Center and Verde Valley Medical Center (VVMC) – which have a combined capacity of nearly 400 beds.
- Flagstaff Medical Center is the only state-designated Level 1 Trauma Center north of Phoenix.

Clinics and Outpatient Services

- NAH provides outpatient services at numerous ambulatory sites throughout Flagstaff, Cottonwood, Sedona and Camp Verde, including:
 - Primary care clinics and specialty physician clinics
 - Cancer Centers of Northern Arizona Healthcare
 - Orthopedic & Spine Institute
 - Cardiovascular Institute
 - EntireCare Rehab & Sports Medicine
 - Weight Management Clinic
 - Outpatient surgical centers
- We provide diagnostic imaging, laboratory and pharmacy services throughout the region. In addition, many of our specialty services – including rural telemedicine, population health initiatives and palliative care – reach far beyond our clinic walls and serve our communities where the need is greatest.
- With eight helicopters, one fixed-wing airplane and 20 ambulances, NAH provides emergency transport services through Guardian Air Transport and Guardian Medical Transport.
